

## Reminder for dog walkers.....

The 'Dog Poo Fairy' unlike the 'Tooth Fairy' obviously hasn't

done what is expected!! Unfortunately, she doesn't work for the

Parish Council so my only alternative is to

remind dog walkers to use the 16 dog litter bins provided that can be found in various places around the village.

Over the past couple of weeks I have received complaints regarding dog walkers not disposing of their pets 'deposits' responsibly. You might think what I am about to say is incredible but there are a few owners who just leave the dog mess where it has been deposited and walk on or, even worse still, drag their dog along as they are eager, or so I have to believe, to get the walk over quickly - it is then spread along the pavement. I have also been told by parents that when they walk their children to and from school they are greeted by several fresh piles of dog mess that they have to dodge. I'm sure we all agree it is an unpleasant experience if you step in it.

The pavement between Brads and the Chemist had three deposits in one week. Dogs are wonderful companions for owners and part of the family at home but their dog's deposits are not good companions for others to take home either on their shoes, accidently dropped toys or pram wheels! These deposits are or can be a danger to health especially for those under 5 years of age.

Most of you who are dog walkers do 'Bag it' and 'Bin It' and we thank you for that but there are still too many 'offenders'. Remember, there are no bad dogs, only bad owners!

You may be interested in the following that I have found doing some research:

### Why is dog fouling a problem?

Dog fouling is not only unpleasant it is dangerous. The biggest threat to public health from dog excrement is toxocariasis.

#### What is Toxocariasis?

Toxocariasis is an infection of the roundworm toxocara canis. The eggs of the parasite can be found in soil or sand contaminated with faeces and if swallowed, result in I nfection that lasts between 6 and 24 months. Symptoms include eye disorders, vague ache, dizziness, nausea, asthma and, in extremely rare cases, seizures/fits. Often the eggs are ingested when passed to the mouth by the hands, but this can also occur through

contact with dogs or other inanimate objects including the wheels of toys and the soles of shoes. Infected soil samples are often found in play areas and as a result, Toxocariasis most commonly affects children between 18 months and 5 years.

### Whose responsibility is it to clear away dog fouling?

It is the responsibility of the dog owner or the person in charge of the dog to clear up any dog foul left by their dog. If you fail to clean up after your dog you can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice, or if the case goes to court a fine of up to £1,000.

The regulations state specifically, that being unaware that the dog has fouled, or not having a suitable means of removing the dog mess is not a reasonable excuse for failing to clean up after your dog.

Finally .....If you do have a sighting of the 'Poo Fairy' on your walks you probably need a rest!

### Please let's keep Middleton clean and fresh for all to enjoy.
